


Pesticides or Planet?

Your Instructions

This week, we have an exciting challenge for you! Imagine you're John, the farmer of a very big vegetable farm. Farmers are leaders who often have to make tough decisions, especially when it comes to balancing the use of pesticides and protecting the planet. This week, you'll get to think like a farmer and make a decision that affects everyone around you.

We're going to talk about something called consideration. Consideration means thinking about how your decisions will impact others and the environment. When making decisions, it's important to think about how your choice will affect your farm, the people who eat your vegetables, and the planet. Even though you're the one making the final decision, you want to make sure it's fair and thoughtful.

To get started, read through the information on the following pages. This will help you understand the situation and what's at stake. Once you've read everything, work with your team to come up with the best decision. Then, share your ideas with the class so everyone can discuss and debate. Remember, the key is to think about how your decision will impact others and to use consideration to guide you.

Step	Action
1	Imagine You're the Farmer: Pretend you're John, the farmer of a big vegetable farm.
2	Learn About Consideration: Understand how to think about the impact of your decisions on others and the planet.
3	Read the Scenario: Read the story about the farmer's dilemma (pesticides vs. planet).
4	Work as a Team: Discuss ideas and listen to each other's perspectives.
5	Analyze the Impact: Think about the good and bad outcomes for the farm, consumers, and the environment.
6	Come Up with a Solution: Decide on the best, fairest solution that balances everyone's needs.
7	Prepare a 2-Minute Talk: Plan a short presentation with your team.
8	Present Your Decision: Share your solution with the class.
9	Vote as a Class: Vote anonymously to decide the best solution.
10	Reflect and Discuss: Talk about what you learned and how consideration helped.

Social Scenario #3
Pesticides or Planet?

'I want to grow the best crops, but I don't know the best way to do it'

Let's dive into a story about John, a farmer. After reading, chat with your friends and decide what John should do. Remember, there's no right or wrong answer, but you only have 1 hour to talk it out before sharing with the class!



Read the scenario below and help John decide.

John is a farmer, and he loves growing crops on his family's land. But he has a big problem. Bugs are eating his crops and the ones that do grow are not big enough. Some farmers nearby use a spray called pesticides to keep the bugs away and chemical fertilizers to help the crops grow bigger...and they're selling a lot of veggies because of it.

But John knows something. These sprays can be bad for the ground, the water, and even the air. They can also hurt helpful bugs and birds. John wonders if he should use the sprays to earn more money or find a different way to enhance his crops and sell them, even if it might mean earning less.

What do you think John should do? How can he decide between making more money and taking care of the Earth?

CONSIDERATION is when we can see the world through everyone's eyes.






Sharing Your Decision

I want to talk about the choices we make and how they impact the very earth that sustains us, and why I believe in a path that benefits all — the land, the crops, and every little creature that calls it home."



Here are five simple steps on delivering a good speech:

Prepare: Choose a topic you're interested in and gather information. Create an outline with key points and practice speaking it out loud.

Grab attention: Start with an engaging opening, such as a fun fact or thought-provoking question.

Speak clearly and confidently: Use a clear and expressive tone, maintain eye contact, and speak at a moderate pace.

Use visual aids or props (if needed): Enhance your speech with pictures or objects that support your points.

End memorably: Summarize your main points and leave the audience with a memorable conclusion or call to action.

Cast Your Vote

Once all groups have delivered their speeches, it's time for an anonymous class vote to see the public opinion. This is like how democratic nations vote in new leaders or make decisions on how the country should be run. This is your chance to use your voice to make a difference and save the world.

Although this scenario is fictional, one day you will be asked to cast your vote on a real issue that will affect people you have never met. This week, we will practice these essential skills.

As a class, write your decision on a piece of paper, and after everyone has voted, tally the totals and announce the decision to the class. Everyone deserves a voice, and this is your chance to use yours.
